## 20 Paper 2 Style Questions

- 1. Discuss the role that regret plays in two works studied. How is regret central to the works' central ideas or themes?
- 2. A good life means different things to different people. Consider how a good life is represented in two works studied.
- 3. Referring to two of the literary works you have studied, consider the ways in which these works employ humour and to what effect.
- 4. Consider how justice is defined in two literary works you have studied.
- 5. How valid is the assertion that literary works are a voice for the oppressed?
- 6. Contrast is often necessary to hold the attention of readers. How and with what effects do two writers you have studied use contrast?
- 7. "Coming of age stories" are ones which present the psychological, moral, and social shaping of a character. Discuss how the protagonist develops in two works you have studied.
- 8. Demonstrate how a comparatively insignificant event can take on considerable importance in two of the works you have studied.
- 9. Examine the portrayal of difference (e.g. physical limitations, mental illness, race, class or sexual identity) in two of the literary works you have studied.
- 10. To what extent do male and female literary characters accurately reflect the role of men and women in society in two literary works you have studied?
- 11. Compare and contrast the role of minor supporting characters in two literary works you have studied.
- 12. How and to what effect are different moral values conveyed in two works you have studied.
- 13. 'Fight or flight' is a term used to describe human responses to adverse circumstances. Compare and contrast how the authors of two literary works you have studied depict responses to adverse circumstances.
- 14. Consider the use to which music and/or musical elements have been made in two works of literature you have studied.
- 15. Referring to works you have studied, discuss how female heroism is represented by writers.
- 16. Explore how 'misunderstanding' and its effects are portrayed in two literary works.
- 17. Compare and contrast the representation and significance of age in two works of literature you have studied.
- 18. Discuss how conflict and resolution are treated in two works you have studied.
- 19. There is no love without suffering. Discuss the extent to which at least two of the works you have studied support this view.
- 20. Referring to at least two of the works you have studied, discuss both how and why the text invites the reader to identify with situations, characters and/or ideas.
